CLEAN YOUR BATHROOM WITHOUT TOXIC CHEMICALS

No doubt your first priority when cleaning the bathroom is eliminating germs and soap scum, but it's important to steer clear of harsh chemicals that can linger in the air and water, and irritate your skin, lungs and mucous membranes. Just like in the kitchen, most popular disinfecting household cleansers are chock full of harmful chemicals. The EPA classifies 275 of the antibacterial agents commonly used in cleaners as pesticides, some of which have been linked to serious health problems. In the bathroom, we're constantly coming in contact with all kinds of surfaces, so these toxins can easily get on your skin, and with the next flush of the toilet, the chemicals will flow into the wastewater system, where they can seep into the ground.

ARE PLASTIC BAGS RECYCLABLE?

Plastic bags can be recycled, however, that doesn't mean they can be placed in your curbside recycling bin. Plastic bags require a specialized collection and processing system separate from other recyclable materials. Most grocers and large retailers such as Target and Walmart accept plastic bags for recycling, or you can look up local recycling options nearest you.

Philadelphia has made strides in curbside recycling in recent years; a record of 127,700 tons of recyclable materials were collected citywide in 2014. Sometimes unaccepted items like plastic bags and Styrofoam still end up in recycling bins, which can damage recycling machinery and slow down the process.
